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


READER'S WORKSHOP CLASSROOMS...

- Harness the power of a learning community as a way to bring all learners together





- Make it a special and fun time with your child





"JUST RIGHT SKILLS"

- Check with your child's teacher to see what level they are currently working on
- Pick a "just right book"
- Kindergarten A-D, Grade 1 E-I
- Choose one skill to focus on (see handout)

- 3. Take reading material with you when you travel.
